After a distinguished career, Professor Frank Billson AO retired from the Foundation Board at the annual general meeting this year.

A founding member of the Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation in 1981, Professor Billson was the first Professor of Ophthalmology at the University of Sydney, starting in 1976 at Sydney Eye Hospital.

He was a surgeon with an intense interest in the science of ophthalmology and was eager that our Foundation should support basic and clinical research. He also recognised the need for the purchase of specialist equipment which would enhance both teaching and state-of-art care at Sydney Eye Hospital.

Professor Billson encouraged ophthalmology graduates to take research and surgical positions overseas at the conclusion of their Sydney Eye Hospital training to continue their learning and development. He supported Fellows funded by the Foundation, to contribute to research while at Sydney Eye Hospital. His passion and advocacy enhanced the worldwide reputation Sydney / Sydney Eye Hospital has, as a Continued over.

Grant drives breakthrough in corneal research

Thanks to your generosity, this 40th anniversary year has been given another important reason for celebration. Your gifts have directly led to a \$1 million grant from the Federal Government for research in the battle against corneal disease and blindness.

Your support enabled us to give \$480,000 towards this work and made clear how vital the ground-breaking research by Professor Gerard Sutton (pictured second from right) and his team gathered from universities in Sydney, Wollongong, Melbourne and Queensland is.

The team was awarded an additional \$1 million for their Australian Corneal Bioengineering: Novel Therapies to Fight Blindness project under the Federal Government's Medical Research Future Fund Frontier Grants Programme.

Bold and innovative ideas

It will create opportunities for researcher collaborations to explore bold and innovative ideas and make discoveries of great potential and global impact. This will allow the team to continue towards the ultimate goal of producing a bioengineered



cornea, thus reducing reliance on donated corneas.

Corneal disease is the third most common cause of blindness among all age groups and the leading cause of unilateral blindness among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

Professor Sutton is an Ophthalmologist and Medical Director of the NSW Tissue Bank, and lead researcher. He is excited by the funding injection and potential new treatments for patients needing corneal transplants. "We have been fortunate to have had the support and encouragement from the Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation.

"Without the Foundation our research would not be where it is today," he said.
