An eye surgery operating theatre can get crowded. The surgeon, the anaesthetist, theatre nurses, and of course the patient, are all in there. Throw in an intern or resident learning vital new skills, and a support person for the patient... that's a fair number of bodies and twice as many elbows.

What if the surgeon had more room? What if there were more opportunities for trainees and visiting experts to watch the operation in progress, in intricate detail, without being in the way?

Right now, Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation is raising funds to give an operating theatre a makeover that will take much of the equipment off the floor and suspend it from the ceiling.



New equipment and more space will make a real difference in the theatre.

A collection of state-of-the-art technologies will enable our skilled surgeons to work more efficiently and less invasively. Crystal-clear 4K screens will reveal the surgery area under brilliant new lights.


The result? More efficient and effective surgeries, saving time and improving training.

We're helping to buy some superb gear to fit out the theatre, such as

- a surgical video machine that can work with a range of eye operations, particularly the nasolacrimal duct, the "waterworks" of the eye;
- brilliant new lights;
- a StealthStation navigation device, an imaging array that lets the surgeon accurately target the treatment area, through non-invasive 3D visualisations.

The technology will also be a great teaching aid, training the next generation of surgeons. The whole team can watch.

Head of Oculoplastic Surgery, Associate Professor Ross Bengler, tells us how thrilled the team are by the prospect: "Through this support we'll be getting a fantastic new OR lighting system.

With the old system we had to bring someone in to move the lights. These you can move with one hand. And there's none of the shadowing effect, where the surgeon gets in the road of the light. In fact the image is vividly shown on a screen in real time."

The StealthStation will be a boon for one of the most challenging surgeries, of the orbital area behind the eye. "There's a jelly-like fat there hiding the optic nerve. This viewing system will give us amazing accuracy and safety. We'll clearly see how far our tools are from a tumour or the nerve."

The high initial cost of the StealthStation will be covered by the foundation. After that software upgrades can be easily afforded by the hospital's own budget. "Everybody is very excited, and grateful for the Foundation's support," says Ross.

The new theatre will especially suit oculoplastic surgery – from traumatic injuries, to unresponsive eyelids, to defects around the eye in newborn children.


We started fundraising for this just before Christmas. On this page you can read one inspiring letter that shows how much the campaign has touched people.

MAJOR DONORS CREATE EXTRA-ORDINARY OPPORTUNITIES

A significant donation can mean something can happen – something that might have seemed but a gleam of a dream.

Keith Walkerden has made two major donations to the Sydney Eye Hospital Foundation, both in the field of eye cancer treatment.

His first gift a few years ago helped the Hospital to provide improved outcomes in radiation therapy for intraocular melanoma, a rare type of eye cancer. The treatment is to sew radioactive “plaques” onto the eyeball and remove them soon after. Traditionally the plaques are of Iodine 125: there’s an excellent 95% cure rate, but vision can start to decrease within two years of treatment.

With a newer isotope, Ruthenium 106, the cure rate is just as good, but vision is better preserved. Even many years after the radiation, most affected individuals can keep good sight in the treated eye.


The problem is cost. Ruthenium 106 eye plaques cost over \$30,000 each, making them virtually unaffordable, even for Sydney Eye Hospital, which is the sole provider of this treatment in NSW.

New fellowship focuses on eye cancer

Since early November, Dr Victoria Mouvet from the Jules-Gonin Eye Hospital in Lausanne, Switzerland, has been working at Sydney Eye Hospital. Victoria has taken up our first ever Fellowship in Ocular Oncology. She already has strong knowledge in the area. The Jules-Gonin Hospital has notable expertise in managing eye tumours in children and adults.

After four months in Sydney Dr Mouvet will do four more at the Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital in Melbourne before finishing with four months in Brisbane.

Enter our generous benefactor ... And his gift has “kept on giving” as NSW Health has since agreed to keep supporting the purchase of the Ruthenium plaques, which need to be renewed annually due to the radioactive half-life of that isotope.
